There are also professional staff members who work alongside commissioned officers in my office, our Public Information Division and so many other areas within the SLMPD.

While each of these members of our department have different roles and responsibilities, each helps make it possible for us to fulfill our mission – and we are grateful for their contributions. They are "unsung heroes" in the law enforcement profession, and they make the work of police officers possible. They play a key role in making our communities safer, and we appreciate their decision to dedicate their careers to serving the City of St. Louis!

We are always working to recruit future police officers, but we also regularly post civilian job openings.
